Vocab

Vocab	Definition
Comparative	An adjective or adverb form used to compare two things, usually ending in -er for short words and using 'more' for longer words.
Superlative	An adjective or adverb form used to compare three or more things, usually ending in -est for short words and using 'most' for longer words.
Regular Adjective	An adjective that forms its comparative and superlative forms by adding - er and -est, respectively.
'Irregular Adjective'	'An adjective that does not follow the typical pattern for forming comparatives and superlatives.'
Equality	The state of being equal in degree or value. This concept is used when comparing two things that are the same.

Contextual Usage

- **Comparative**: The elephant is larger than the lion.
- Superlative: Mount Everest is the highest mountain in the world.
- Regular Adjective: The cat is smaller than the dog.
- 'Irregular Adjective': She is braver than I thought.
- **Equality**: My laptop is as fast as yours.

ESL Warm-up Activity

Get the students into pairs and ask each pair to think of three comparatives/superlatives. For example: bigger, smaller, faster, slower, etc. One student will act out the adjective while the other guesses which comparative/superlative they are portraying. This activity encourages students to use comparative language and sets an engaging tone for the lesson while getting students actively involved right from the start.

Main ESL Lesson Activities

Vocabulary Activity: Comparatives and Superlatives Charades

Divide the class into groups. Each group will write down a list of comparative and superlative adjectives on separate pieces of paper, fold them up, and place them in a container. One student from each group will pick a paper from the container and act out the word without speaking, while their team tries to guess if it is a comparative or superlative form.
