### **ESL Warm-up Activity**

This exercise fosters creative writing skills by leveraging vocabulary learned from the novel for descriptive storytelling purposes.

## **ESL Homework Assignment**

For homework, students will be tasked with writing a short narrative from the perspective of their dæmon as if they were part of the events in The Golden Compass. This assignment reinforces vocabulary and encourages students to engage creatively with the novel's themes. Additionally, students can prepare a

brief presentation discussing how their dæmon's role could impact the storyline, promoting critical thinking and public speaking skills.
